Background & Basic Info

Little Eagles Child Care was created based on the needs of the Madison community. After the community decided to open a child care center, the MMN School started putting the necessary steps into action. They visited area child care centers and gathered information on what it would take to start one.

The Lac qui Parle Valley Community Education department, staff, and school board members led the effort to bring a child care to the school.

Building

The child care center is located on the east end of the MMN Elementary School in Madison. The Lac qui Parle Valley School District covers the costs for day to day operations such as electricity, heating, etc.

Four rooms make up the child care center. Two of the rooms are for infants and the other two are for toddlers and school aged children.





Schedule

Little Eagles is open Monday through Friday from 5:45 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. with the exception of major holidays.

Food

Breakfast, lunch, and a morning and afternoon snack are provided to the children. The MMN Elementary School food service prepares and delivers the meals to the child care. They utilize the Child and Adult Care Funding Program to cover the costs of meals.


Start Up Costs

Loans & Grants

Little Eagles has utilized grants from Peacetime Emergency, Southwest Initiative Foundation, and Child Care Aware. They apply for the Child Care Aware rating each year and receive grants through their star ratings. In their first year of operation, they had one star. Currently, they are up to two stars. They hope to increase each year, giving them the opportunity to receive more grant funds.

Challenges and Successes

Challenges

Some of the biggest challenges the Little Eagles director, Melissa Katzenmeyer, noted that the child care faces have been the budget, planning, and hiring staff.

At the beginning, they had a high turn-over rate with the Assistant Teacher and Aides positions. She said they struggled finding people who were interested in helping build the cognitive and emotional growth of the children. They overcame this challenge by making connections, they sought out people who they have heard through the community would be a good fit to hire. Because of this they have been able to hire more caring and compassionate staff and accept more children from the waitlist.



Successes

Since Little Eagles has opened, they have been able to meet the needs of the community offering a curriculum based child care center in a nurturing and learning environment that the children look forward to attending.
