Housing & School Enrollment

The data presented below includes statistics related to school enrollment and housing in the Region, including median home values, median rent, median monthly housing costs and vacancy rates for counties in the UMVRDC Region and the State of Minnesota.

At \$77,100 the median home value in Lac qui Parle County is below the State of Minnesota at \$206,200, and is the lowest among home values in the Region. This trend continues for the median monthly rent and median monthly housing costs, as Lac qui Parle County has the lowest overall housing costs in the Region.



Home ownership vacancy rate and rental vacancy rate are the proportion of the homeowner or rental inventory that is vacant "for sale" or vacant "for rent." The overall vacancy rate includes other vacancies such as vacant "sold – not occupied," seasonal housing and vacant "rented - not occupied." In 2010, Lac qui Parle County had the second highest overall vacancy rate among surrounding counties.





The population distribution shows that there is a higher middle age population (ages 45 to 60) in Lac qui Parle County with lower percentages of the population in the younger and older age cohorts. Lac qui Parle County has nearly an entirely white population, which is typical for counties made up of small, rural communities.

Lac qui Parle County has seen an overall decrease in population from 1960 to 2010, with the greatest decrease of over 2,000 people occurring between 1960 and 1970. The number of households increased by 7% over these same years, however the significant decrease in average household size offset that increase. The population is projected to decrease over the next few decades, and although not as dramatically as the last fifty years, Lac qui Parle County is projected to loose more population in the future than almost all other counties in the Region.



Unemployment Rates, 2000-2011



The employment categories shown in the table above and chart below show the 11 Super Sectors of Industry, which is the federal standard in data pertaining to business and industry. Much of the economic activity in Lac qui Parle County is in Education in and Health Services and over one third of all employment comes from Education and Health Services. In 2011 Lac qui Parle County had an unemployment rate of 5.3%, which is the lowest in the Region and below that of both the State of Minnesota at 6.4% and the nation at 8.9% during the same time period.
