Housing & School Enrollment

The data presented below includes statistics related to school enrollment and housing in the Region, including median home values, median rent, median monthly housing costs and vacancy rates for counties in the UMVRDC Region and the State of Minnesota.

At \$97,600, the median home value in Swift County is below the State of Minnesota, however both the median home value and the median monthly housing costs are among the highest in the Region. Median monthly rent, on the other hand, in Swift County falls in the middle, with Big Stone County setting the base and Chippewa


County at the top.

Home ownership vacancy rate and rental vacancy rate are the proportion of the homeowner or rental inventory that is vacant "for sale" or vacant "for rent." The overall vacancy rate includes other vacancies such as vacant "sold - not occupied," seasonal housing and vacant "rented - not occupied." In 2010, Swift County had vacancy rates similar to surrounding counties.

School Enrollment Since 1999

The school districts in Swift County have all seen declines in enrollment and Swift County is home to the Region's most rapidly declining school district—Lac qui Parle Valley School District. The decline in enrollment is consistent with the declining and aging population in the Region. Note that data was only available for public school districts.






Swift County Population Distribution, 2010

The population distribution shows that the county is aging with a large percentage of the population between the ages of 45 and 60 years. Swift County has nearly an entirely white population, which is typical for counties made up of small rural communities. However, some communities in Swift County, such as Kerkhoven and Murdock are becoming increasingly diverse.

Swift County has seen an overall decrease in population from 1960-2010, with a large decrease occurring over the past decade (2,173 people), however much of that decrease, as well as the increase in population from 1990 to 2000, can be attributed to the prison located in Appleton. When the prison opened, it added 1,324 to the population statistics in the 2000 Census. It was later closed and thus, not counted in the 2010 Census. Swift County also lost a significant portion of its population from 1980 to 1990. The population is projected to decrease over the next few decades, however less dramatically than it has in the past.



data pertaining to business and industry. Much of Swift County's economic activity is in three different sectors; i) Trade, Transportation, and Utility Services, ii) Manufacturing, iii) Education and Health Services. The pie chart below details that in Swift County, nearly half of all employment comes from the Education and Health Services and Trade, Transportation and Utilities sectors. The county had a slight increase in unemployment during the Recession of 2007 to 2009, but in 2011 had an unemployment rate under 7.5%, which is higher than the State of Minnesota's rate for 2011 of 6.4%, but below the national average of 8.9%.


